## **NEWS FROM EDITH HALL**

Edith has been invited to be Cornell Visiting Chair in the Humanities at Swarthmore College, Pennsylvania for the Fall Semester of 2003. There she will give a course entitled 'Greek Tragedy 458 B.C. to 2003 A.D.: Murders in the House of Atreus', and organise a symposium on the theme of 'Staging Aeschylus today', at which Olympia Dukakis will run a workshop on acting Clytemnestra with the director Peter Meineck. Also participating will be Helene Foley, Ellen McLaughlin (translator for the NAT's recent *Persians*), and Robert Auletta (translator for Peter Sellars' 1993 *Persians*). The symposium will begin at 1pm on 14 November and is open to all who are interested.

In addition to giving lectures in April on the performance reception of the *Oresteia* at Princeton (Faber lecture) and Columbia (as the keynote speaker at the Center for Mediterranean Studies' conference), and related lectures at Harvard, Glasgow, and the British Museum in winter 2002/2003, this summer Edith ran an international conference at the University of Durham on 'Cultural Responses to the Persian Wars' which included discussions of drama, art, and cinema from the Renaissance to the present day. Edith has also written the programme essay for Barrie Rutter's forthcoming production of Blake Morrison's *Antigone* (see the back page for tour).

Lastly, Colin Teevan has been selected as the Arts Council North-East's Literary Fellow 2003-2004. He will be attached to both Newcastle and Durham Universities and will be involved in seminars on performance reception.

# POSTGRADUATE ACTIVITIES

The 3<sup>rd</sup> annual postgraduate symposium on Greek drama in modern performance was held in Oxford and Egham at the end of June. Jointly organised by the APGRD and the Drama Department of Royal Holloway, the two-day event brought an audience of sixty together to hear fourteen papers on the theme of 'The Chorus in Modern Performances of Greek Drama', two of which (by Chris Vervain and Yana Zarifi, both of RHUL) included substantial practical demonstrations. In addition, Avery Willis (Oxford) produced a series of readings from modern adaptations under the collective title 'A Greek Chorus Line'.

Kathleen Riley and Avery Willis, two of the APGRD's current Graduate Associates, both in the final stages of their doctoral work at Oxford, organised a very successful seminar series in the summer term of 2003. The weekly format of 'Dionysus Recast' was a pairing of a postgraduate plus an academic, with a performative element where appropriate. The academic speakers were Peter Brown, Edith Hall, Lorna Hardwick, Stephen Harrison, Tom Paulin, and Matthew Reynolds.

## 'STUDYING THE ANCIENT THEATRE': A COLLOQUIUM IN LONDON

The Institute of Classical Studies, London and The Society for the Promotion of Hellenic Studies are to hold a colloquium on 11-12 March 2004 on the theme of 'Studying the Ancient Greek Theatre'. The purpose of the event is to celebrate the work of the ICS and SPHS, and to 'show-case' current research and research projects based in the UK. Participants will include Chris Carey, Richard Green, Alan Griffiths, Edith Hall, Nick Lowe, Gregory Sifakis, and David Wiles, and there will be space devoted to the work of postgraduates and 'young scholars'. Proposals of 250 words are invited for (a) the two 'young scholars' sessions, one on archaeological, dramatic, and literary themes, and the other on performance, practice, and reception themes; and (b) exhibitions and other visual presentations of graduate work-in-progress. <sup>CR</sup>Music Theatre Wales, in a co-production with l'Opéra National du Rhin and the Berliner Festwochen, will present the first full production of Param Vir's opera *ION*, directed by Michael McCarthy. The première will be in the opera house in Strasbourg on 19 September, with further performances in Colmar, Mulhouse, and Berlin. The UK tour begins on 23 October at the Royal Opera House.

™ Thiasos will present *Bacchae* at London's Cockpit Theatre from 27 October to 1 November. The production, directed by M. J. Coldiron and Yana Zarifi, will feature a new translation by Richard Seaford and original music by John White. Farrah, the eminent Algerian designer, is the consultant for set and costume.

∞ Alastair Elliot's translation of *Medea*, under the direction of Ferni Elufowoju, will be performed at the West Yorkshire Playhouse from 14 November 2003.

™ The Oslo Players will present *Oedipus Rex* at Oslo's Teaterscenen in early December. The production, directed by William Mann, will be in English.

™ 2004 will see two productions of Walter Braunfels' operatic adaptation of *Birds*: *Les Oiseaux* at the Grand Théâtre, Geneva in January / February (dir. Iannis Kokkos), and *Die Vögel* at the Volksoper, Vienna in March / April (dir. Birgit Meyer).
